## Eversole family fonds MG 32, I, 2-15

January 24 [1911]

[The Deanery, Lincoln]

Dear Mr. Eversole.

Your interesting letter is to hand. I am now hear [sic], <u>very busy indeed</u>: much busier than I ever was. They put me on every committee *and* make me chairman of course – perhaps with preaching *and* speaking I am really without a minute. I am writing now as it is my only chance today.

Now as to Farm.

I propose directly the farm pays for itself, *and* begins to make, to offer you a further 20 dollars out of every [p. 2] 100 dollars <u>net</u> profit, after next June, by wh*ich* time we shall se what this year has done: *and* we can better estimate net profit.

<u>I am in no hurry to sell</u>: I am perfectly ready to keep the farm 10 years or more if I live, or longer still.

But if you are offered \$150 dollars an acre for farm *and* buildings (<u>not</u> stock – <u>that</u> would have to be sold separate) half <u>down</u> and half on mortgage bearing interest, take it. [p. 3] I will give you 1000 pounds out of the purchase money: and I will give you <u>in proportion</u> more if ever the tide sets our way and you get more than 150 dollars per acre.

We may have to wait a bit – but it is worth while – for I am sure syndicates will come along some day – and (I think) it is worth your while too.

As I am not driven to sell <u>at all</u>; for I may so far as my own needs go keep it as long as I like. Some day when [p. 4] this comes off, if it does, you must come to England *and* see us at Lincoln! How you would enjoy it.
