From the Director's Desk

Will the REAL leaders please stand up!

Those of us who attended the national convention of the Federated Zionist Organization of Canada in Montreal were delighted with the "Young Turks" who came to the fore and refused to play the game by the rules set up by the establishment.

They were not prepared to continue the status quo in Canadian Zionist life where constant bickering and a struggle for power by various Zionist groups has left the Zionist constituency ineffective and divided.

These young men and women crossed party lines, united in the belief that the whole is more important than its component parts. With effective arguments for their point of view and with political savoir-faire, they used the full democratic processes to impress the will of the delegates upon the Zionist leadership.

The results of this "happening" may not be apparent for some time. But the fact that these young people had the guts not only to question the establishment, but change the system, is an important development in itself in Canadian Jewish life.

How gratifying it would be in our community of Edmonton if we had more people interested in the future of our community as a whole rather

than only with their respective organizations. How refreshing it would be if some of our capable young men and women in our community would have the guts to question the establishment on the wisdom of draining our human, physical and financial resources by perpetuating duplicated programs, facilities and services.

Of course it's always easier to sit on the sidelines and be swept along with the tide, even easier to criticize a situation without doing anything about it and most easy to remain aloof.

There are many people in our community who feel that because we have a multiplicity of organizations we are over-organized. We are not over-organized. The fact that we have various Jewish organizations in Edmonton with some functioning comparatively well is healthy. Not only is it hopeless to attempt and eliminate this diversification in Jewish life, but also undesirable. This type of pluralism is the result of people's belief that they not only have a right to be different in a democratic society, but also have the need to be different.

The problem is not that we are over-organized. The problem is that we are not organized enough in the sense of functioning as one community. The problem is that each organization is so wrapped up in preserving its own autonomy and in justifying its own existence that in the process the needs of the total community are ignored.

Hopefully, there are young men and women in our community, active in various organizations or not, who will perceive this weakness in our community structure and be prepared to do something about it.

We have many capable people in our community who have for too long ignored the dictum of Hillel, "Separate not thyself from the community." This precept places upon each Jew a responsibility to participate fully in the affairs of the community. Community affairs are personal affairs. We cannot stand aside as objective, impartial, detached onlookers. We need to add our individual strength, our individual vitality, our individual resources to the common pool.

The future of the organized Jewish community of Edmonton depends on this happening.

Will the real, new leadership of this community please stand up!

campaign this year in an effort to secure maximum coverage and upgrade the level of giving by women in the community.

"Last year," she stated, "only 301 women out of a potential of 789 contributed to the UJA and Survival Fund. The suggestion that because husbands give to the campaign, women need not contribute, is not valid. Women's giving is PLUS giving," continued Mrs. Shoctor. "Women's UJA Divisions exist in most communities in the U.S. and Canada because women believe in and accept their responsibility for preserving and strengthening Jewish life at home and in Israel."

Mrs. Shoctor pointed out that last year women contributed over \$20 million to the UJA and Israel Survival Fund in the United States and Canada. "These vital plus dollars would not have been pledged by their husbands if women had no opportunity to make their own contributions. Women contribute generously to various campaigns sponsored by their own women's organization. Certainly the major Jewish campaign in our community — the UJA and Israel Survival Fund — merits even greater support by all our women as well."

In an effort to upgrade women's contributions in keeping with the great needs this year, the Women's Division, as is the case with the men, is approaching contributors on the basis of their largest gift since 1967. In 1967 women in Edmonton raised \$25,000. Last year, the total pledges from women was \$9,440.

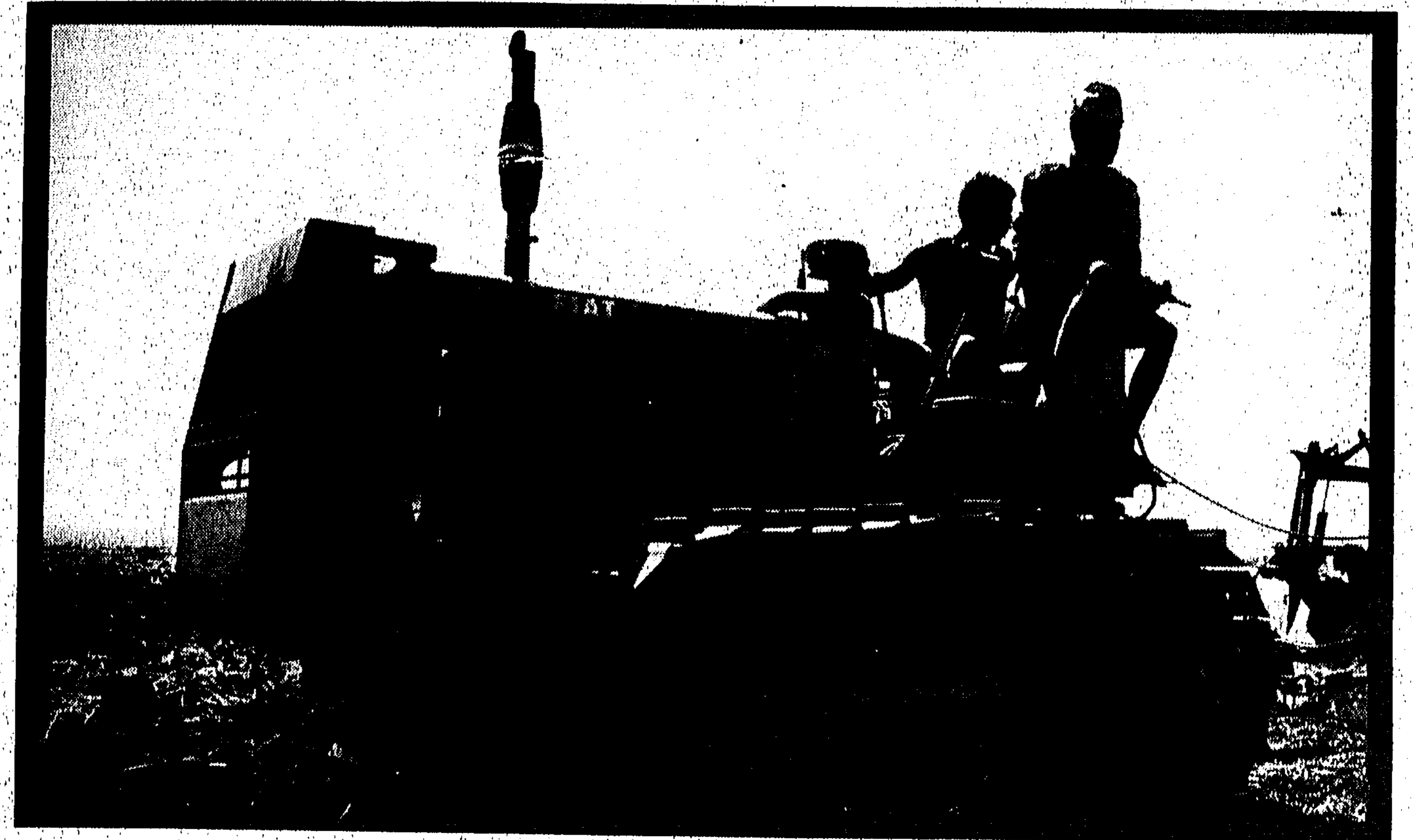

Joe Shoctor Q. C. elected National Secretary of FZOC

Joseph H. Shoctor, Q.C. of Edmonton, outstanding Canadian Zionist leader, was elected National Secretary of the Federated Zionist Organization of Canada at the recent national convention in Montreal. The convention saw the emergence of a group of "Young Turks" who were successful in breaking the party key that determined the make-up of the FZOC executive in the past.

A past President of the Jewish Community Council of Edmonton, past UJA and Survival Fund Chairman, past Negev Dinner honoree, Joe Shoctor has been active in

every phase of Zionist activity, both in Western Canada and on the national scene for many years. Elected national Vice President of the United Israel Appeal of Canada Inc. at their convention last month, Mr. Shoctor also serves as Vice President of the Zionist Organization of Canada.

Active in overall communal affairs, Joe Shoctor was recently named Chairman of the 1970 Edmonton United Community Fund. A graduate of the University of Alberta and senior partner of Shoctor and Kennedy, Joe Shoctor has enhanced the cultural life of

Edmonton as founder, President and Executive Producer of the Citadel Theatre. He is a member of the Board of Governors of the National Theatre School of Canada and Honorary Governor of the Dominion Drama Festival. Mr. Shoctor was first Secretary-Manager of the Edmonton Eskimos Football Club and in 1966 was named B'nai B'rith "Citizen of the Year".

Following the same path of her husband's commitment to the State of Israel, Mrs. Joe Shoctor, also active in communal affairs, is this year's Women's Division Chairman for the United Jewish Appeal and Israel Survival Fund.

Judge Samuel Lieberman elevated to Supreme Court

The Honourable Mr. Justice Samuel S. Lieberman of Edmonton has the dual distinction of being Alberta's first judge of the Jewish faith and the first Jewish Judge to be named to the Supreme Court of the province.

A past president of B'nai B'rith Lodge 732 and a prominent lawyer, Justice Lieberman was sworn in as Alberta's first Jewish Judge on November 21, 1966 as Judge of the District Court of the District of Northern Alberta. On February 12, 1970, Mr. Lieberman was elevated to the Trial Division of the Supreme Court of Alberta.

A native of Edmonton, Justice Lieberman was admitted to the Alberta Bar in 1949 and was appointed a Queen's Counsel in 1962. He has been a member of the firm of Friedman, Lieberman, Newson, Cipin and Caffaro, of which his father, M.I. Lieberman, Q.C., veteran Edmonton lawyer and sportsman, has been one of the

senior partners.

Justice Lieberman had five years of service with the R.C.A.F. and R.A.F., attaining the rank of Squadron Leader and served as a pilot in Europe and the Middle East. Forty-eight years old, Mr. Lieberman has been active in both Jewish and general communal affairs. In addition to his work with B'nai B'rith, Justice Lieberman was a member of the Beth Shalom Board of Trustees, a member of the Board of the Jewish Community Council and active in the United Jewish Appeal. Formerly a member of the Board of the Canadian National Institute of the Blind and the Eskimo Football Club, Justice Lieberman is a member of the Provincial Council of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, the Provincial Advisory Committee of the Air Cadet League of Canada, and Director of the Air Cadet League of Canada. He is a past president of the West Edmonton Kiwanis Club, the Edmonton

Chapter of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, the Edmonton Eskimo Touchdown Club and a former Director of the Central Volunteer Bureau of the City of Edmonton, Mayfair Country Club and the Edmonton Club.

Posts held by Justice Lieberman since 1966 include Chairman of the Electoral Boundaries Commission of Alberta, Chairman for Alberta of the Board of Review under the Criminal Code of Canada, Chairman of the Legal Aid Pilot Project for Alberta, and President of the Sir Winston Churchill Society for 1968 and 1969. Justice Lieberman is married to the former Nancy Berman of Chicago who has been active in the community as Past President of the Beth Shalom Sisterhood, National Board Member of the National Council of Jewish Women and Treasurer of the

Jewish Welfare Fund of Toronto this programme has been made possible.

The Canadian Foundation for Jewish Culture was organized in 1968, and is concerned with development of Judaic Studies on university campuses, and with scholarship for advanced research by Canadian scholars. The Commit-

tee which met with officials of the University of Toronto consisted of representatives of the Foundation and the Central Region of Congress.

The United Jewish Welfare Fund of Toronto has approved a grant of \$25,000 a year for three years towards the cost of this programme.

University of Toronto expands Judaic Studies

In 1970-71, the University of Toronto will offer a much expanded selection of courses in Judaic Studies. This programme is intended for both specialists, and students who wish to take only one or two of the courses. In announcing this expanded programme, the Student-Faculty Committee for Judaic Studies and Hillel Foundation of Toronto, states that it is planned that specialists in Judaic Studies may take the third year of the programme at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. A total of nineteen courses (including two projected courses) is being offered.

Rabbi Stuart E. Rosenberg, President of the Canadian Foundation for Jewish Culture, Sydney M. Harris, Q.C., Chairman of the Central Region, Canadian Jewish

Congress and Abe Posluns, President of the United Jewish Welfare Fund, in a joint statement, point out the major development in Judaic Studies, which this announcement encompasses. "The number of courses now being offered places the University of Toronto in the forefront of Judaic Studies in Canada. The students have requested these courses, future generations of students and scholars in continuing studies will benefit from the programme now being offered."

Talmud Torah provides Jewish identity - Mintz

"Like most kids, I didn't think too much about the Talmud Torah when I first left it, but as I became more active in B'BYO and now in my religious studies at the University, I realize how important a part the school played in providing a Jewish identity." The thoughts belong to Jack Mintz, university student, International President of AZA, the largest Jewish Youth organization in the world, and former student of the Edmonton Talmud Torah.

Having just returned from the B'nai B'rith Supreme Lodge Leadership Conference in Israel two months ago, Jack felt his schooling and background gave him a decided advantage over the other North American delegates in that his ability to speak and understand Hebrew gave him an added insight concerning problems in Israel. His

knowledge of ritual and tradition was most helpful, too, at the international convention last year at which he was named AZA Grand Aleph Godol.

Jack feels the school should go to grade twelve, because it is in these later years that we formulate many of our ideas and opinions and a strong Jewish identity is very important at this time.

According to Jack, anything that helps to promote Jewish identity and hence Jewish survival must have top priority in the community. "I am most critical of parents who refuse to send their children to the Talmud Torah for fear of isolating or prejudicing them. It's a most naive argument," he adds "A lack of Jewish identity is one of the most serious problems our young people face today."
