




Our best wishes for a joyous Passover to the entire community.

# WesternJewish Historic Exhibit Here Aug. - Oct.

"Journey Into Our Heritage" a visual history of the Jewish communities in Western Canada, opened a twelve month March 14th at the Centennial tour of the West on Sunday, Museum in Vancouver. Prepared by the Jewish Historical Society of Western Canada and funded by the National Museums of Canada and by private subscription, the exhibit depicts the arrival, life and times of the Jewish immigrants and the face of the community today.

Highly sophisticated in its design and concept as a travelling exhibit, "Journey Into Our Heritage" has assembled a richly evocative display of photos, documents, and objects of cultural and religious significance. There are forty-four panels, eleven supplementary volumes of documents and photos, seven showcases, and three audio-visual units.

The story-line was written and the project planned and co-ordinated by its chairman, Harry Gutkin, assisted by Dorothy Hershfield, the executive director of the Society, and Esther Nisenholt, the archivist. Jewish Historical and archives groups across western Canada participated in the collection of material.

An attractive poster and a twenty - eight page illustrated catalogue have been released, featuring the heroic sculpture of Moses by the distinguished artist Leo Mol, who is presently working in Winnipeg.

Following a one month stay in Vancouver, the exhibit will proceed to Victoria, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon, Regina and Winnipeg. In Edmonton it will be shown at the Provincial Museum and Archives from August 26 until October 24 inclusively.

## Community Responds To Histadrut Drive

Edmonton Histadrut Campaign for student scholarships in Israel is receiving a good response.

Since 1950 the Histadrut in partnership with Canadian Jewery have built thirty-four large well-equipped modern schools teaching over a hundred different trades and are dotted throughout the length and breadth of Israel. Some 24,000 students fill the classrooms and workshops learning everything from typing to advanced electronics. In addition they are learning all subjects to qualify for entrance to University. The problem is of course, that each year some 4,000 applicants to Amal schools are turned down — not because of lack of space — merely because funds are not available. Their families are too poor to provide the minimum \$250.00 for one year tuition. Our goal in Canada is to provide 1,000

scholarships annually to relieve the situation.

In the Canadian field that is of interest is the appointment of Mr. Leon Mitchell, Q.C., of Winnipeg, Man. to the position of Deputy Minister of Labor in Ottawa. Mr. Mitchell has been and is a strong leader and supporter of the Histadrut.

Through the affiliation of the Histadrut with the leadership of the labor movement in North America they are strong supporters of the State of Isr.el. Their leaders have sent strong protests to the United Nations on the recent resolution condeming Zionism with Racism. They represent the support of millions of workers for the State of Israel.
